Live in Resurrection Faith!

According to the Barna Group, most Americans consider Easter a religious holiday, but fewer correctly identify its meaning. "Two out of every three Americans (67%) mention some type of theistic religious element" on Easter. However, the research shows that "a minority of adults directly linked Easter to the Christian faith's belief in the resurrection of Christ. In all, 42% of Americans said that the meaning of Easter was the resurrection of Jesus or that it signifies Christ's death and return to life" (the Barna Group, March 15, 2010).

Many non-Christians describe Easter as a holiday for having parties with family and friends, family vacations with children's spring break, or having fun with dyeing and hiding eggs. What kind of meaning do we Christians find on Easter? The Barna Group states that "those who identify Easter explicitly as a celebration of the resurrection of Jesus were most likely to be evangelicals (73%), large church attenders (60%), born again Christians (55%), active churchgoers (54%), and Protestants (51%)."

Easter is a time for us to renew our resurrection faith in Christ Jesus. Not only did Christ Jesus resurrect but also we will experience our own bodily resurrection in God's time. We may not fully understand how it works, but we believe that Jesus Christ became the first fruit of resurrection and that we will participate in the resurrection of Christ Jesus. Faith is not about understanding or knowing all God's mystery. Rather, it is about trusting in the Lord even when we do not know or understand. "O God, help us our unbelief and make us believe!"
