WORSHIP MATTERS: SACRED SPACE

The obscure Israelite prophet Habakkuk declared "The Lord is in his holy temple; let all the earth keep silence before him." The Lord is everywhere, of course. But we have demarcated certain buildings and spaces as sacred. Not that other places aren't sacred. But perhaps if some place is sacred, we can discover the sacred in other places; and if no place is sacred, then no place is sacred.

I love it that the most beautiful buildings anywhere, in any culture, are the religious sanctuaries. Complaints inevitably are filed that money is spent on a church building. But isn't the glory, attention to detail, and lunge for majestic beauty profound ways to display our love for God above all other things we invest in? And isn't the church building a declaration to a cynical world that, at least on this corner, there still is a God?

I love the short little hymn, "Surely the presence of the Lord is in this place." Architecture for churches varies. My second parish out of seminary felt like a small school auditorium. My next church's sanctuary reminded a friend of mine of an International House of Pancakes. It's more what's in the room, who's there, and why they've come. There's usually a visible Bible - so we are people whose beliefs and values aren't random but fixed on a sacred book. There's a baptismal font - reminding us that we are baptized, that we are sealed by God's Spirit.

What we do in this space, even if other non-churchy things go on during the week, is different from anything else. We bow our heads. Where else do people *en masse* close their eyes and keep quiet. We hear somebody else tell us how to live in a world where it's normally up to us to decide. We listen to music, and make music - not for our own enjoyment so much as for God's pleasure.

Care for this building is up to those who enter. I love the Lincoln Memorial but I don't tithe my income for its upkeep. This building is for God. In little churches, the people do the sweeping, repairing, replacement of light bulbs and shrub trimming. It's care and love for God, isn't it? When we donate to keep the building in shape, the lights on, the AC running, it's our love for God, isn't it?

Sure, you can be attentive to God on a golf course or at the beach. But are you really? Are you challenged there? Is there a big Bible there? Are there other people there seeking God while you are? There your money goes to keep up the resort or the fairways, not for God.

We can be sure, any time we show up in the sacred space for worship, God is honored. I don't know about you, but I want to honor God as often as possible. So come this summer to some sacred place at least on the Lord's Day, with the Lord's people, and pray together, sing some songs, bow your heads and be still, and know in this place that there is still a God, that God is still God.
