## "Weak Enough to Believe!" (Matthew 21:8-11; 26:69-75)

(Palm Sunday Sermon by Rev. Jae Lee)

Dear Calvary Church, may the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ welcome and greet you in this very challenging time. I pray that all of you are doing well and healthy in body and spirit!

In the past couple of weeks, we have had ups and downs. We have a dear friend who is in the hospital with pneumonia. Two of our members are released from coronavirus by the Health Department. With this unexpected coronavirus, I have realized how weak, how vulnerable, how ignorant, and how incapable we human beings are.

I would like to share a message of the Lord based on our weakness, the weakness of the crowds who once welcomed Jesus at the triumphant entrance to Jerusalem but easily betrayed him, and the weakness of Peter who even failed to hide his Galilean accent when he denied Jesus three times. However, our weakness can be an opportunity to believe and come closer to God!

In Matthew 21:8-11, we can observe that Jesus' entering the Jerusalem was a phenomenal event with a big crowd. Some of them went ahead of Jesus, spreading the palm branches or their own garments on the street, and others followed Jesus behind and sang the joyful song. The whole city of Jerusalem was in turmoil. People opened their windows and came out to see the parade of Jesus and the crowd. "What is going on here? Who is this man?" The crowds answered them, "This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee."

We don't know exactly who the crowds were. At least from the Scripture, however, we can guess that in somehow the crowds met Jesus in different circumstances: Maybe, some of them were in the seashore of Galilee when Jesus proclaimed the Beatitudes on the mount; some of them might receive the food when Jesus blessed the five loaves and two fish and fed more than five thousand people; some of them might be eyewitnesses when Jesus healed the sick and casted out the demon; some of them might have hope in Jesus for their nation's liberation from the oppression of the Roman Empire. We can only imagine that in somehow the crowds encountered Jesus in their different life contexts. That's why they were excited to welcome Jesus to Jerusalem and spread out their clothes and the branches and introduced Jesus to the residents of Jerusalem who didn't know Jesus yet.

However, a week later, their hope turned into disappointment, doubt, and betrayal. Their welcoming *Hosannas* became their angry voices to crucify Jesus on the cross. Again, we don't know why the crowds have changed their attitude toward Jesus. We can imagine that the crowds might be naïve enough to trust their religious leaders who accused Jesus or they may have received bribes or were simply manipulated. Whatever reason they had, the crowds showed their weakness and failed to continue believing in Jesus!

Moreover, the story of Matthew 26:69-75 is even shocking to us because it describes Peter's painful denial against Jesus. When Jesus was arrested by the soldiers and the high priest, Peter followed them and stayed in the courtyard of the high priest because he wanted to know what's going on. Then Peter denied Jesus three times. Peter truly believed Jesus as the Son of God and proclaimed his faith not only with his words but with his actions. Peter was the last one who would betray him... but even Peter denied Jesus when he failed to hide his Galilean accent in front of Jerusalem residents. He even cursed and swore an oath, "I do not know the man!"

Dear church, when we have fears, we become weak and lose our mind. With the sudden attack of the coronavirus, the whole world undergoes a painful time. In particular, our nation seems to have been seriously impacted from the virus. Out of fears, we shrink ourselves from each other, we distance from our loved ones, and we have lost our southern hospitality, hugs, kisses, and sweet greetings.

I am not a scientist and I don't know when and how we can finish our war against the coronavirus. However, I know and believe that our weakness is an opportunity for us to

come closer to God. When we lose our human ways to save ourselves, when we truly realize our weakness, when we become weak enough that we cannot solve our problem by human knowledge and might, we get to turn toward God and ask God's help!

I don't want to criticize the crowds who changed their voices and attitudes toward Jesus. I won't blame Peter who denied Jesus three times because I also recognize my own weakness. When Peter denied Jesus three times and heard the cock's crow, he remembered what Jesus had said. That moment of *remembrance* was the opportunity for Peter to turn around and come to the Lord. Peter wept bitterly! The moment when Peter was weak enough to deny Jesus became a turning point to truly believe in Jesus.

We used to think in this 21<sup>st</sup> century we can do everything: There is nothing we humans cannot accomplish! Haven't we built a babel of arrogance, conceit, and even godly power? Didn't we think we can do everything without God's help?

When we realize our weakness, it is the right time for us to remember the love of God who created and blessed the world and gave us the power of stewardship to take care of the whole universe and become fruitful in the harmonious relationship with other creatures.

Dear church, let us humbly accept our weakness. Let us embrace our weakness and remember that the Lord still loves us as who we are. It is time for us to turn back to the love of God who created us and sustains us. When we become weak enough, we can truly believe in the Lord! Our weakness is not a shame, but an opportunity to turn toward God who touches our weakness, pain, and hurt and makes us healed and strong!

In this holy week, let us honestly look at our physical, spiritual, and social weaknesses and ask God's holy interruption in them. Our loving God will hug us and welcome us in the new and deeper relationship and give us strength to overcome our weakness! In the name of the Father, of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Loving God, Your desire is for our wholeness and well being. We hold in tenderness and prayer the collective suffering of our world at this time. We grieve precious lives lost and vulnerable lives threatened. We ache for ourselves and our neighbors, standing before an uncertain future. We pray: may love, not fear, go viral. Help us to practice social distancing and reveal to us new and creative ways to come together in spirit and in solidarity.
