MOTHER OF JESUS (Luke 2:50-51 / John 19:25b-27)

Sermon on Mother's Day, May 10, 2020

Happy Mother's Day! Each year we have given a flower to our mothers at Calvary on Mother's Day, but this year we cannot practice our beautiful tradition due to the pandemic. However, it does not change our hearts of thanksgiving toward our mothers. Whenever I hear the word 'mother,' my heart is filled with gratitude and honor for mothers' sacrificial love and care! I believe that becoming a mother is not only about bearing a child, but also about nurturing a child who needs care and love until his/her maturity.

According to the British Council's 2004 survey, 'mother' is the most beautiful word in the English language, followed by passion, smile, love and eternity. Unfortunately, it is not true that all mothers in the world are sacrificial or devoted to their children. Some mothers have failed to nurture their children, and others have even discarded their own children for many different reasons. However, the word 'mother' still gives us strength and insight for our lives.

Today I would like to share a message on the mother of Jesus. While the Catholic Church reveres Mary as "Queen of Heaven," our Protestant Church does not admit it because there are few biblical references to support the Catholic Marian dogmas. I accept the virginity of Mary, but her conception of Jesus was acted by the Holy Spirit. Even though Mary was full of grace, according to Karl Barth, "her grace was not earned by Mary but totally given to her as a gift." Of course, I don't doubt on the greatness of mother Mary for Jesus.

Mary's great motherhood is apparently found in the Gospels. Luke 2 describes an event of missing child Jesus. When Jesus was 12 years old, his family and relatives went to Jerusalem for Jewish tradition and worship gathering. On the way back to Nazareth, the family lost Jesus because they were hurried to leave the crowded city of Jerusalem, assuming that Jesus must have been with their traveling group. For three days Joseph and Mary searched for Jesus and finally found him in the Jerusalem temple. Mary asked Jesus, "Child, why have you treated us like this? Look, your father and I have been searching for you in great anxiety." We may understand the heart of mom and dad here. Jesus answered, "Why were you searching for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?" People did not understand what Jesus meant, but Luke pointed out the mind of Mary like this: "His mother treasured all these things in her heart." Mary must have renewed Jesus' special birth and relationship with God in her heart.

I think that not only Mary but most mothers would treasure all memories with their own children. From time to time, my wife and I talk about our children. When they were seriously ill with high fever, when a child had a joint out of place, when a child's ankle was swollen with unknown cause, when a child who has allergy was stung by an ant, and when a child made her first goal in a soccer

game, when a child got a prize at his spelling bee, and so on... Raising three children has not been easy. Whenever I talk with my wife about our children, surprisingly enough she remembers all the details. I just wonder how she – mother of three children – remembers all the experiences of children! As Mary treasured all things on Jesus from the very young, our mothers do the same, don't you, mothers?

Let me move to the Gospel of John 19, which is the crucifixion scene of Jesus. In verse 25, Jesus' mother Mary was standing near the cross of Jesus at Golgotha. It must be the most painful moment for Mary to observe, but she was there near her son in his last moment. I believe that our mothers would stand near their children all the time, in particular, in times of suffering and crises of their children. Whether it is a seat of honor or a place of shame or disgrace, mothers always keep their seat for their children. Through the conversation between Jesus and Mary, we can see how much Jesus has cared for his mother Mary. Even on the cross when Jesus discovered his mother, he called his loved disciple and said to him, "Here is your mother." Jesus asked his disciple to take care of his mother. Mary and Jesus show the intimate relationship between mom and child.

Let me show a picture. You may recognize this famous sculpture, called *Pieta* created by Michelangelo. Pieta in Italian means "pity" or "compassion." As you see in the picture, Jesus' mother Mary holds his crucified son Jesus in her lap. Michelangelo used his artistic imagination to show the love Mary had for her son. She feels pity and compassion toward him after he had been betrayed.



While this sculpture shows great details, we may find something very strange. Jesus, a grown-up man, is held on his mother's lap like a child. Compared to the body of Jesus, Mary is much bigger and stronger. The sculpture may embody the greatness of mother. While Mary looks very sad, her face looks very young and beautiful. For Michelangelo, Mary might be the ideal mother who is much stronger than her son, has mighty power to embrace her son, and is always beautiful even at the very moment of sadness without aging.

All of us have a different kind of upbringing experience with our own mothers. All of our mothers are not the same as Mary the

mother of Jesus, but they also treasure and cherish each moment with their own children and stand near them with their presence and prayerful support. In particular, when our children get weary and struggle with life's challenges, our mothers would stand near them and pray for them with their crying heart as Mary did for Jesus.

All we are children of our mothers. As Jesus did to his mother Mary, we can take care of mother's well-being and care for them with our obedient heart. If your mother is in heaven, you may support and care for a motherlike figure who has shared love with you.

On this Mother's Day, let our love overflow in our homes, communities, and nation by giving thanks and honor to our mothers and mother like figures who have shown their loving care for

us. When we are filled with loving relationships with one another, we may build and restore a Christian home where we are meant to love one another in the name of Jesus Christ.

In the name of the Father, of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen!
